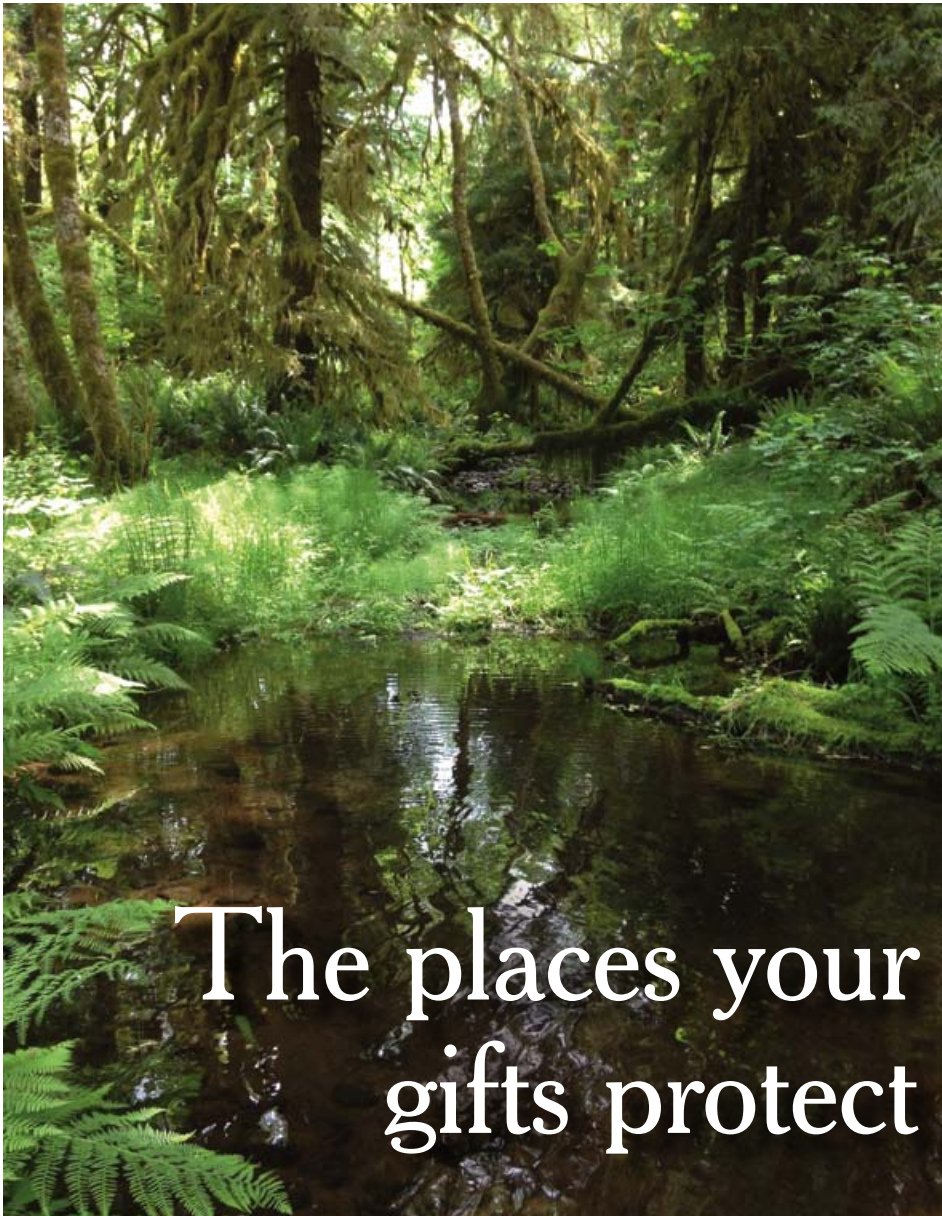

The places your gifts protect

Field report from Tenmile Creek by Joe Moll

On an overcast summer's day three years ago, four of us hovered in three feet of water, snorkeling the lower end of Tenmile Creek near Yachats. My boys and I had donned wetsuits against the cold water to spend the day exploring the pools and riffles, log jams

and gravel beds. We watched coastal cutthroat trout feed on caddis flies and other aquatic insects. We marveled at the palette of stones on the bed of the stream, and the splash of light that dispersed with the cascading water.

But most memorable, so much so that my youngest son reminded me of it this week, was our chance encounter with an ammocoete, a young lamprey, that emerged from a silty area we discovered.

My son reminded me of our good luck when I told him I was heading back down to Tenmile to meet with landowners and monitor the conservation easements we'd secured in 2006. Those voluntary agreements protected 60% of the remaining private land in the basin.

On this monitoring visit, I was stunned to see how the creek had shifted naturally over the years. Pools on one side now had moved to the other. A log jam that began with one tree we could crawl over had now grown to a height of 15 feet, piled deep and wide with many other limbs, logs, and trees.

But I was most surprised by the good fortune of finding an adult lamprey, spawned out and dead, on the bottom of the stream. Thinking back to the young ammocoete, this adult was its reflection; their lives formed a complete loop.

Tenmile Creek provides remarkably diverse habitat, and the array of fish and wildlife that use it are a testament to its health. **These are the places you protect**, from the ammocoetes that emerge this year, to the adults they become, returning to the watershed years down the road. May each one always be there to complete that cycle. And may we always be around to enjoy it.
